Facts on writing to a Florida inmate

1. Inmates are permitted to receive written correspondence and greeting cards, but cards must not contain electronic or other non-paper parts.
2. Up to 15 pages of additional written materials, such as clippings or magazine articles, can be enclosed.
 - Each page can be no larger than 8 1/2 x 14 inches in size
 - No item can be glued, taped, or stapled to a page
 - Photographs may be included
 - Self-addressed stamped envelopes may be enclosed
 - Up to 20 First Class U.S. postage stamps may be enclosed
3. The following items may not be enclosed:
 - Non-paper items
 - Items of a "non-communicative nature" such as lottery tickets or matchbooks
 - Stickers or stamps (other than postage stamps)
 - Laminated cards or other laminated materials
